

## James A. Dunbar United States Army

Private James Dunbar's port of embarkation was Pier 16, Staten Island, New York and after a 12 day crossing of the Atlantic, James landed in Le Havre, France. He next rode a train for about five days to Nuremberg, Germany and arrived there on the 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> of May. He was actually at the front lines for the first time the night after the war ended in Europe. He would remain in central Europe for 1 year, 3 months, and 17 days. During that time his responsibilities included training initially for the Pacific Theater with the 191<sup>st</sup> Tank Battalion until the atom bomb was dropped. He was also assigned to the Service Company 774<sup>th</sup> Tank Battalion. He drove a truck all over Germany carrying German prisoners of war as they surrendered: one such trip involved driving 180 prisoners 600 miles to Belgium. He also carried tank track, K rations and gas.

In August 1946, Tec 5 James Dunbar was discharged from the US Army and returned home after receiving medals for shooting and one bronze star. He returned to farming in rural Wellsville on his family farm where he resides today. He recalls Psalm 91 being of particular comfort to him as he left to serve his country: "He that dwells in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty. I will say of the LORD, He is my refuge and my fortress: My God; in him will I trust."
