## Gene Henry

Gene was a member of the first ROTC class at Central Missouri State College and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in November 1970. Following this, he attended Field Artillery Officer Basic School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He then entered the Missouri Army National Guard and attended weekend drills as well as annual training. Throughout his 28 years of service, he continued his military education with



many courses. He earned the Field Artillery Officer Advanced School certificate and graduated from the Army Command and General Staff College. Gene commanded field artillery batteries in Independence, Richmond and Albany. He also commanded a battalion in Columbia.

One of Gene's most memorable duties occurred while he was Executive Officer of the Delta Battery, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 129 Field Artillery in Independence. On December 27-28, 1972, he was called upon to direct the firing of two 21-gun salutes at Harry S. Truman's funeral. This unit was commanded by Mr. Truman during WWI. They fired the first salute with six howitzers when Truman's body arrived at the Truman Library and the second salute at the conclusion of the funeral.

Gene continued his training throughout his years of service. He trained in many states in all kinds of terrain and weather under widely variant commanders. The best pieces of advice he was given were that he should provide succinct answers to questions asked and that only a fool makes a decision before knowing all the facts.

Awards include the Meritorious Service Medal, the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, the Armed Forces Reserve Medal, the Army Service Ribbon, the Missouri State Emergency Duty Ribbon, and the Missouri National Guard 25 Year Service Ribbon. He also received marksmanship badges and the Presidential Unit Citation awarded to 1st Battalion, 129 Field Artillery for service during WWI.

In his civilian life, he taught school for three years and then worked in banking for 40 years as well as refereeing several different sports.
