

George William "Pete" Hellwig joined the service in August 1969. He enlisted with a draft notice in his back pocket and chose the Officer Candidate School (OCS). He went to Ft. Leonard Wood, Missouri, for basic training and was then sent to Ft. Benning, Georgia, for OCS School. Upon arrival, he was informed that the class was filled and it was too late for him to join the program. He spent two weeks getting outfitted only to be notified that the Army had overestimated the number of officers needed, and therefore, Pete was released from the OCS program.

Pete was given a choice of regions to serve and he chose to serve in a geographic region of Fort Carson, Colorado. While stationed in Fort Carson, he served in the payroll department and received several commendations for his service while in the Army.

After serving two years he was released from the Army and went back to graduate school. After school, Pete worked in making metal in the production industry,
