She was only 18 years old at the time and knew that military service meant that she could be asked to lay down her life for her country, She still proudly took her Oath of Enlistment and went on to basic training at Fort Jackson in South Carolina. Upon graduation from basic training she was sent to Fort Lee in Virginia for Quartermaster training and was finally stationed in Topeka, Kansas, where she was assigned to the 714th Quartermaster Platoon.

During service in the US Army National Guard, Dana earned the Kansas National Guard Achievement Medal, Kansas National Guard Service Medal, Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, and the Army Service Medal.

She gained experience in motor pool operations, Army Preventive Maintenance Checks and Services (PMCS), warehousing, administrative duties, and Army Warrior Leadership.

She fondly remembers the times she spent participating in maneuvers where she had to stay overnight in an Army tent. everyone. She also emphasizes the educational and on-the-job training earned through military service.
